Middle School Mathematics Olympics



The winners of the 2017 Middle School Mathematics Olympics were announced to the district by Dr. Tina Powell, Director of Mathematics and Science, after a daylong academic competition at Montclair State

University (MSU) on May 25. The participants, Grade 6 and 7 students, representing each of the District's elementary schools, along with their coaches and chaperones attended the competition supported by Dr. Erin Krupa, from MSU's College of Science and Mathematics and graduate students.

The second annual event involved a three part competition involved several elimination rounds, organized by grade level. First was the Written Round, where teams were given an allotted time to solve several equations. The sheets were scored and teams were selected for the Buzzer Round where they had to buzz-in with answers to complex word problems and mathematical equations. The final round was a Video Round which pitted the two top teams for each grade against each other to solve math problems presented in a video created by Math Adventure. The format was interactive and allowed the other team of students to participate.

The Stock Market Game, Across the Globe

Mrs. Keogh's 7th and 8th grade Math Core students played the Stock Market Game at Scholars Academy this Spring. They completed a project called *Across the Globe*, as part of the Stock Market Game curriculum. This project introduced students to the concept of globalization through a series of activities on issues related to outsourcing of labor, currency exchange, free trade organizations like the World Trade Organization (WTO) and trade agreements like the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). Students were given opportunities to connect these issues to their decision-making process in The Stock Market Game.

Students began the project looking at Currency Exchanges. They demonstrated an ability to read a currency exchange chart, compute currency exchanges, and finally calculate the value of their Stock Market Game portfolio into three (3) different currencies.

The final authentic assessment had students demonstrate their understanding of globalized markets by having a formal debate on the issue of outsourcing and its impact. Students were evaluated on their level of research evident in speeches and questions; quality and quantity of relevant arguments throughout the Debate, effectiveness of speaking skills, and overall impact of the debate.




