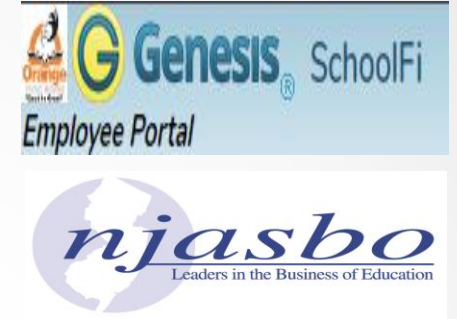

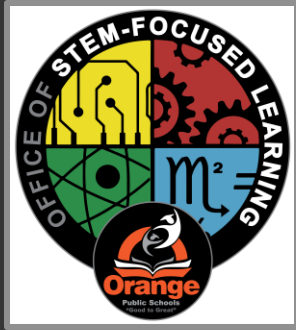
SEMI PROGRAM

READING TREASURES

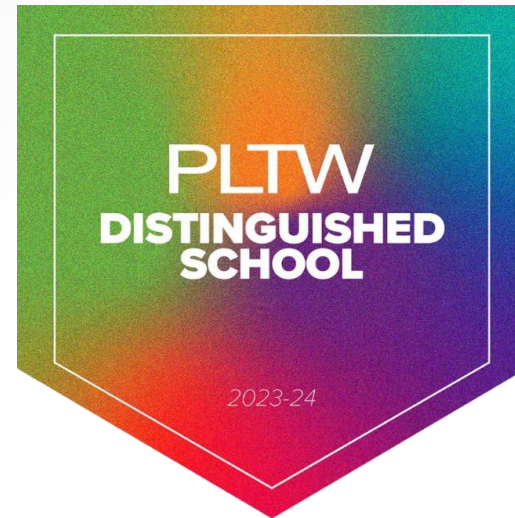

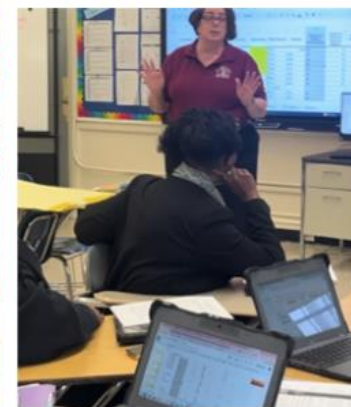
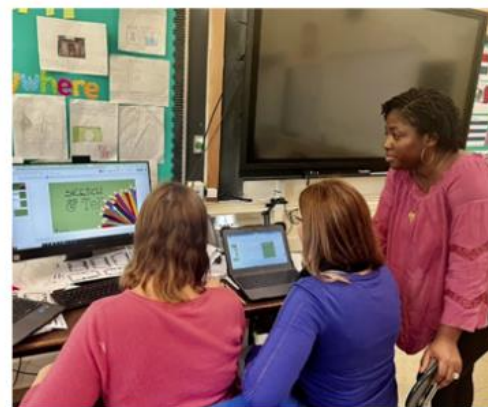
While OPA of I&I has experienced an enormous amount of success during the 2023-2024 school year, what we want to highlight the most is being a Verizon Innovative Learning School. We are proud of our growth in these two areas and will continue to build upon these successes during the 24-25 school year.

At least 50% of our teachers have grown one or more levels on the TIMS Matrix. This was accomplished through, our weekly Common Planning Time to model best practices and ed-tech tools, while also checking in on the teachers to determine if additional support is needed. The Teacher Leader Corp is also leveraged to provide support to teachers during these meetings and to clarify VILS expectations if needed.

Our first cohort of the **Teacher Leader Corp** met for the first time on Dec 11th to review the purpose of the team and set goals for the school year. Our Teacher Leaders were recommended by the Principal and the VILS Coach, and all members were willing to participate.

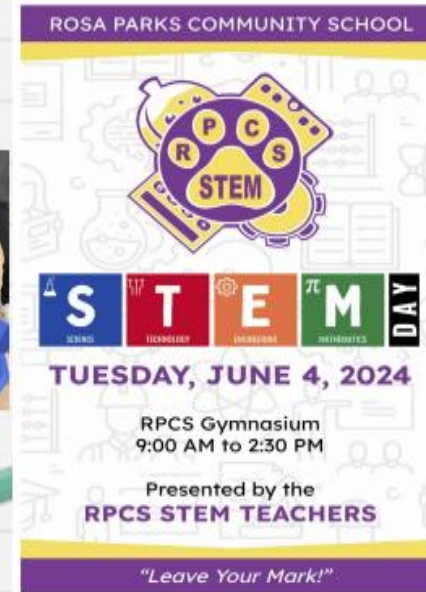

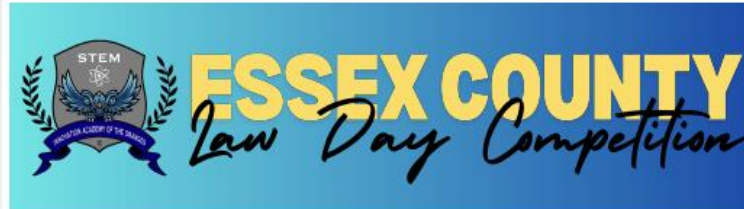

- In the 2023-2024 academic year, we Introduced the Ice cream social as an opportunity for both staff and students to launch the school year.
- Whole School Salsa dance lesson hosted virtually from Puerto Rico with dance Instructor (relative of World Language staff member).
- MOU Mondays were dedicated to the completion, review and revision of student memorandum of understanding.
- We held regular navigation meetings which helped care advisors meet the needs of our students.

- Compass Night did not disappoint. There were representatives from community colleges, four-year colleges, armed services, vocational and the department of labor for Essex County.


